


Moving the Conversation Forward By Allan Eakin, Associate Editor

Over the last several months, conversations about renewing the vitality and interest in our associated work have grown in number and frequency. That is encouraging.


The response to the special insert, Why Do We Associate in the April 19 issue of the Baptist Trumpet, has been positive. So much so that the Baptist Trumpet chose to produce a booklet containing those six articles and make it available to anyone who desires to receive a copy free of charge. The Baptist Trumpet followed up the April 19 insert with an Associational Involvement Survey for BMA pastors to complete. This survey asked pastors to provide input concerning their involvement in the associated work, the participation of the church they serve in the associated work and gave the opportunity to provide feedback about how to encourage greater participation in our associational work.

Amid the various conversations and the Associational Involvement Survey data, it became apparent that certain assumptions were made concerning understanding how our association of churches functions. 
• Conway, Dec. 12 — Playing inside the friendly confines of A.R. Reddin Fieldhouse for the first time since Oct. 28, CBC hosted the Patriots of Baptist Bible College (BBC). CBC (9-3) trailed at halftime for only the third time this season, but put up 50 points in the second half to complete the season sweep of BBC (3-8) 87-82. Deshawn Corprew led the way in scoring with 17 points, while Jonas Carlisle and Sage Borbon both had 15 and Devin Foster chipped in with 13. Christian White and Kyle Harding were the co-leaders in rebounding with eight, while the Mustangs were able to dominate in the paint, outscoring the Patriots 46-34 in that area and also outscoring them 19-9 off the bench.

• Little Rock, Dec. 15 — Playing for the final time in the 2023 calendar year, CBC headed a half hour down the road to Mims Gymnasium for a non-conference matchup with Philander Smith. CBC (9-4) trailed at halftime and nearly came back fully before falling to the Panthers (7-5) 93-78. Sage Borbon, Kyle Harding and Jonas Carlisle all posted double figures scoring for the Mustangs, while Carlisle led the way in rebounds and nearly tied a program singlegame steals record and Harding led the way in assists. CBC struggled shooting, making only 38% of their shots, while going 5-33 from beyond the arc. The Mustangs were also dominated on the glass, getting out rebounded 47-29.

• Conway, Dec. 12 - Returning home for the first time since Nov. 18, CBC hosted the Patriots of Baptist Bible College (BBC) at A.R.Reddin Fieldhouse.CBC (1-5) took the lead early and held it the rest of the way, racing to an 85-74 win over BBC (7-4). Caroline Citty led four Mustangs in double figures with 22 points, while Olivia Lambrigtsen added 15 to go with a team-best eight rebounds, Tamara Christmas chipped in with 14 and Rhys Anderson added 10. The Mustangs outshot BBC 50% to 35% from the field and outrebounded them 45-32.

Wrestling •Conway,Dec.14—Competing at home for the second time this season, CBC hosted a dual with the Eagles of Oklahoma Wesleyan. CBC dropped the dual 48-9, but were able to get a pair



Looking to the New Year

These last few years have been full of ups and downs for all of us. Between the pandemic, unstable church attendance and crazy social and political issues, staying motivated and focused on our purpose as student ministry workers has been hard at times. We have had to navigate Zoom youth group, masks, social distancing, the return to normal services and the rise in the anxiety of our students. The only real constant in student ministry is change, but we have had a crazy time of it since 2020. With the New Year just around the corner, it is a great time to evaluate where you are and where your youth ministry is.

Since no two churches are alike, we shouldn't expect our student ministries to be cookie-cutter images of one another. In fact, your student ministry will adapt and change slightly every year as students enter and others graduate. Sometimes, those transitions happen at the normal times, the beginning and end of school years. However, course corrections may be necessary mid-year to get back on track.

The question remains, "How?" How do we evaluate our current situation and look into necessary changes?

Lookatyour mission. Being an auxiliary of your church, your student ministry should reflect the mission and vision of the congregation as a whole. If your congregation doesn't have a specific mission or vision statement, know that a student ministry exists to help your students become more devoted followers of Jesus. Are you focused on that primary purpose or has your youth group become a social club? It is not an easy question to ask yourself, but it is an important one.

• Look at your teaching. Our lessons and sermons are of primary importance. Students receive a lot of information through YouTube and TikTok, but can they trust it? More often than not, the answer is no. As caring adults in the church, we need to give them a steady diet of the Word that their parents can build upon.

Look at your volunteer squad. Are they on the same page when it comes to purpose and focus? If we don't intentionally discuss these issues with our volunteers, our ministry can be pulled in different directions. It is important to have leaders with different strengths and areas of emphasis, but your squad needs to move forward together.

• Look at your own spiritual disciplines. As the leader of your group, it is important to take a close look at how faithful you are in reading the Word, praying, sharing your faith, giving and worshipping. Our commitment, as leaders, is reflected in those God has put under our care. Whether you are a youth pastor or a Sunday School teacher, your students are looking at what is going on in your life and what you hold as important. Besides being an example, we minister out of these disciplines, and our goal is to minister out of the overflow.



Be Strong and Courageous

2023 is about to end, with the opportunity of a new year before us. What will your church do with the challenge to live courageously the principles and truths of God's Word? Courage can be defined in many ways, but one definition by W.Phillip Keller is "the willingness to obey God regardless of personal cost."That describes an unwavering obedience without compromise or hesitation. It is driven by fearing God more than fearing what man may think or do to you. Today's world's philosophy promotes selfdevelopment while the Scriptures teach self-denial. We are called to offer our lives as living sacrifices.

Spiritual growth and discipleship are summed up multiple times in the Scriptures by passing truth to the next leader, the next generation and the next believer. Jesus led by example in teaching and being with the 12 disciples. Paul poured into young men like Timothy and Titus. We have the example of Moses and Joshua. Psalm 78:3-4 talks about the things "Which we have heard and known, and our fathers have told us. We will not hide them from their children, shewing to the generation to come the praises of the LORD, and his strength, and his wonderful works that he hath done."

In Deuteronomy 31, Moses tells Joshua to be strong and courageous; he had nothing to fear because God would go with him. In Joshua 1:6, God tells Joshua, "Be strong and courageous." Joshua challenges the people with the same cry of courage, and they even respond to his challenge in verse 18 by restating it back to him, "Above all, be strong and courageous." Moses' leadership mantle had fallen on Joshua, and he was ready to do what God said and willing to put his life on the line for that obedience. Joshua believed what God said, and his faith led him to follow Him, believing He

meant what He said.

• Let's begin this journey of courage by praying dangerous prayers. In 21 Dangerous Prayers, author Gary Rohrmayer wrote, "Any encounter with a Holy God can be dangerous - not in a life-threatening way, but in a way that can be life-altering and soulshaping. All too often, we pray safe prayers — God bless me, God help me, God protect me, God heal me and God provide for me. Dangerous prayers are risky and life-stretching. Dangerous prayers come out of a spirit of brokenness. Dangerous prayers are filled with boldness and daring faith."What courageously dangerous prayers do you need to pray? Maybe Psalm 139:23-24 or Psalm 85:6-7?

· Make sure you lead courageously. Henry Blackaby stated, "Courage is the confidence that God is with you and will not forsake you." Joshua was a man who knew what it was like to lose the vote in a business meeting, 10-2, and go against the prevailing consensus. God is more interested in your obedience to His commands than your pedigree, preferences or origins. You must lead with biblical convictions, even if that requires standing alone. Be courageous, but also be caring by empathizing with those struggling, realizing they are not ready to give up what they are clinging to so tightly.

•Lead courageously by pursuing those who are far from God, just like Jesus did. Courage will require not depending on what others are doing but instead choosing to do what God has called you to do. Have the courage to love like Jesus loved and to love what He loved. Be moved with compassion for those who are not following Him. Following Christ requires seeking His face and following His lead courageously. Godly courage is following Him in the midst of

your fears. J.D. Greear said, "God does not call the brave; He makes brave the called!" Paul stated that he was in prison for the advance of the gospel.

• Have the courage not to become enamored or fixated on "bigger is better" but, instead, courageously disciple others. Discipleship is messy, hard and timeconsuming, but well worth it. If you are not discipling, have the courage to repent. Begin leading your church by demonstrating what discipleship looks like. Remember, the speed of the leader is the speed of the team. Your success in discipleship does not depend on your history or heredity but rather upon your present obedience to the heavenly Father. Even if you were never discipled by others, refuse to use that as an excuse and begin discipling now.

•Courageouslyremindyourself and others of God's faithfulness. In Joshua 1:5, God reminded Joshua that Moses' accomplishments were because of His presence. God promised to walk with Joshua the same way He walked with Moses. That is the same promise He is making to you in Matt. 28:20. No power can defeat the God who guides you. We tend to quickly forget times when God's presence showed up powerfully in our lives. Do not be guilty of spiritual amnesia. Joshua remembered how they crossed the $\operatorname{Red}\nolimits$ Sea on dryland, and, if you reexamine the path you have already traveled, you will see His presence and guidance.

Let our anthem for 2023 be Joshua 1:6, "Be strong and of a good courage: for unto this people shalt thou divide for an inheritance the land, which I sware unto their fathers to give them." God's promises are true. Let's have the courage to pray dangerous prayers, lead others courageously, love others outrageously, make disciples who make disciples and remember God's faithfulness through the years.

What is God's Word saying to you? Where is the Holy Spirit of God leading you? What actions of obedience do you need to obey courageously?





What About the Christmas Tree?

I was just thinking about a topic that has been bantered about for years. Is it wrong for Christians to celebrate Christmas with Christmas Trees? All my life, I have heard this debate, and some adamantly oppose placing these ornament-bearing trees in the homes of believers. So, what about the Christmas Tree?

A Misconstruing of an Old Testament Passage

Some use Scripture to support their opposition to Christmas trees. They refer to Jer. 10:3-5 (NIV) — "For the practices of the peoples are worthless; they cut a tree out of the forest, and a craftsman shapes it with his chisel. They adorn it with silver and gold; they fasten it with hammer and nails so it will not totter. Like a scarecrow in a cucumber field, their idols cannot speak; they must be carried because they cannot walk. Do not fear them; they can do no harm nor can they do any good."

The assertion is that this refers to the pagan practice of adorning trees. However, that is not what it speaks of at all. For many centuries, the custom of the Israelites was to worship the poles made from the trunks of trees. It may have referred to the ornate Asherah Poles, which skilled craftsmen sculpted as they formed a goddess to be worshiped. After the sculpting was completed, others (silversmiths and goldsmiths) would overlay the wooden form with the precious and costly silver and gold. Once completed, the pole no longer resembled a tree at all.

The Symbolism of the Evergreen Tree

While Christmas trees are often artificial in our modern era, most still look like evergreen trees. There was a reason that the evergreen tree was chosen to be brought into homes. Much symbolism relating to Jesus Christ is applied to the nature and beauty of the evergreen.

The beautiful branches represent everlasting life provided by God with His gift to mankind when Jesus was born in a stable and placed in a feeding trough. As families decorate their trees with lights (originally candles), the truth is projected that Jesus is the Light of the World. He is also the Word of God, and His Word is a lamp to our feet and a light for our paths.

Atop most trees is a very special ornament. For some, it is an angel, reminding us that the Christ child was surrounded by the angelic host praising God for the young Child's birth. Others place a star atop their trees. The symbolism here reminds us that there are those who still seek Jesus. The Magi followed a star until they finally came to where the Lord Jesus was, even some two years after His birth.

Beneath the Christmas tree are usually gifts. These are to remind us of the inexpressible Gift of God to us in His Son, Jesus Christ. However, our giving is an admonition from God's Word, and Paul expressed it during his ministry — "In everything I did, I showed you that by this kind of hard work we must help the weak, remembering the words the Lord Jesus himself said, 'It is more blessed to give than to receive" (Acts 20:35).

The Tree is Symbolic; Not to be Worshiped

In Jeremiah 10, the trees were cut and sculpted into poles to enable the worship of idols — false gods. That is not the purpose of the Christmas **See TREE, Page 7**

corridor. Lifeword Partner Amos Bangarigumu also reports that the Mampruli language programming is changing the lives of many of the Mamprusi people.

Nigerian Partner Joseph Eniowo and others are building a studio in their church building where they can record more shows.

• In Asia — Joe Costa reports that amidst the volatile political and social climate in Lebanon, God continues to work through their efforts. This is obvious through the numeric growth with 16,100 followers on Instagram, 30,600 on TikTok and 41,600 on Facebook. Their hope is to reach people online, then engage with them offline. They have an engagement team of four people who disciple 35 young men and women and lead three Bible studies.

Lifeword Team Member Kishan reports that they have witnessed a spiritual harvest of 250 new believers and 41 baptisms in Nepal. They are seeing the number of house churches and small groups multiply.

In the Philippines, Pete Etabag shares that they have three new radio stations to install on new islands. He is also teaching classes at the BMA Bible College on how to be a media missionary.

• In Europe — Lifeword Partner Bogdan Bilav reports that the recordings are going well for the various languages they serve: Romanian, Hungarian, French and Gypsy.

• In the Americas — Carlos Panameno, a church planter and taxi driver in El Salvador, is a new Lifeword team member who has started a new show — The Right and Straight Road. Valmori Zelaya reports 1,500 online listeners to his show from various countries.

In Honduras, Luis Gonzalez shares that they are expanding the outreach to the Miskito people and the Garifuna people.

Even though the socio-political situation in Nicaragua is volatile,

with the government closing over 200 "religious" schools and shutting down all communications that are not state-run, Lifeword team members have seen 12 students come to know Christ through their school ministry.

Lifeword partners in Panama, Ronald and Carolina, are starting new social media programming for young Panamanians.

New content is going out daily from the US through Instagram, Facebook, TikTok, Podcasts and blogs. The English Facebook page recently surpassed 1 million followers, with more than 25 million unique visits this year. Lifeword.org is in the top 15% of all worldwide websites. The new discipleship portal, Follow, is in the final stages and plans to launch before the end of the year. Lifeword Sunday was a success, and many churches are faithfully partnering with Lifeword in the mission to "Share Jesus. Make Disciples. Everywhere."

This is just an overview of the spiritual harvest taking place across the globe. We praise God for all He has done this year, His invitation to be a part of His work and for our faithful Lifeword partners.

Please pray for team members in Burkina Faso to be able to plant new churches with those who have been displaced, for God to provide for the needs of food and clothing in Ghana, for the community radio station in Nigeria to reach more in their community and for new churches and revival across the country and for the church in Paraguay and as pastor Nino takes the leadership, for the volatility of Panama (the country has been in political lockdown for the past 15 days, leaving citizens without much food or fuel and employment for many). Also pray for the upcoming launch of "Follow" and that God will continue to send out workers into His field and that He would reap a spiritual harvest for His glory. Thank you for joining us in prayer!

We just experienced another "boring" month of small beginnings in foundation laying. I want to share some highlights with you:

• God is allowing spiritual warfare. We had another bout with COVID, and this kept us from working in the fields the way we would prefer to be working. We also saw a continued absence of core team members who have played a significant role in the church plant formation and work. And the weight of not being available to minister to my family or our church due to taking on additional hours of work created issues and strains in both places.

With the absence of people stepping up to fill the void, there is a noticeable difference in the church and home. Laura and I have been leaning on Jesus to take care of everything, provide help we are still waiting on and help us be content as we wait and live in the weakness allowed in this season. We are still alive,working and waiting,knowing what little we are able to do is what God calls us to do at this time. We are trusting in Christ to be enough.

God is opening doors and spreading the gospel. God has also been opening new doors to take the gospel to new places. I was asked a while back to come and lead the Kansas and Western Missouri Association's Missions Rally. Dan McGee, who heads up the association, allowed me to seek God on the theme for the event. I sought God in prayer for several weeks and arrived at "We Are Unashamed of the Gospel." I shared what is going on in Minnesota and preached a sermon with the same title and message from Rom. 1:14-17.

At the gym I'm working in part time, the door has been opened to share the gospel. hours' notice and when I was out of town. He has also been leading me through a book he really wanted to turn into a group for the church in the future. It has been a joy to watch him grow and flourish and hear about how God is using him at Teen Challenge in his internship.

We even made some progress on some of the home repairs that drove me to pick up extra work, and our vans are now both running. We are thankful to God for all the help and provision He has given.

• God is helping us enjoy our boringlives. There isn't much that is glorious about our lives to those who live out in the world. We don't take vacations or go on exotic trips. We don't usually get away for a weekend or even go to concerts or events. We work to protect and strengthen our marriage, to be parents who know and love their kids each day and help our kids have daily habits and routines that will allow them to live disciplined lives as adults, to be present and prepared for our jobs in the church and to keep our promises to those who count on us.

I spend a lot of time studying in the hours no one is awake, praying when I am by myself, planning and prioritizing and a lot of time saying I can't do things due to other obligations. I also spend a lot of time listening to people at regular, pre-arranged times. I have habits of hygiene, physical health, mental health and spiritual health that I work to guard and protect. To some, it is boring. To me, it has proven to be a gift that provides life. God has used it to help us persevere and endure through hardships. Despite feeling stretched, we have also been able to see God protect us and keep us together, growing deeper in love with those He has given us and more connected in our church and family with the few who desire to be connected.

We also continued working through the sermon series and teaching series, and Laura continues to lead the women through a book on church membership on Friday nights. We are focused on diligently finishing the things we start. We plod along week after week, and what we see is that God provides growth. He even does this in what many believe are boring, normal, non-exciting things.

Please pray for God to give our people a hunger to learn how to study, not just read, the Scriptures for themselves. Also pray they will learn how to move beyond selffeeding to feeding others.

God has given us a unique ministry. We serve in a hard part of a hard city. Overcoming the challenges of poverty, broken homes, incarceration, mental illness, physical illness and violent crime keeps some groups and individuals from coming to join us to serve here. I get that, but it doesn't have to keep us from reaching the people of North Minneapolis together. I need help. I need prayer support for the spiritual warfare that is ramping up again. I also need supplies and financial support to be free to evangelize the lost and disciple those who are coming to Christ.

The Epic Story of Truth: Part 2 (The Promised One, Crushed **Serpent and New Creation**)

In this series of articles, we're looking at prophecy, the return of Jesus, the Millennial Kingdom and God's continued plan for Israel in a different way. They aren't separate subjects but part of the complete narrative running from Genesis to the maps in our Bibles. We're hopping in the plane and gaining that 30,000 ft. view of Scripture — the big picture, and it is big. The story of truth told in Scripture is epic. It shows that there is so much more to Christianity than we make it, and we're also invited into this continuing epic tale.

Our journey through this epic story of truth started at creation, seeing how God created the world as we know it. He created us. Adam and Eve were in the Garden of God. They literally walked with Him in the cool of day. They interacted and intermingled with not only the plants and animals in God's Garden, but also celestial beings. One of those beings convinced them to disobey God, leading to them sinning. That sin separated the fellowship they had with God the Father, and they were kicked out of the garden. They, the world and even the deceiving celestial, Satan, were cursed. Yet there was a promise in the aftermath of the first humans' rebellion. God promised that the curse would be lifted, the earth would be made new and mankind would be restored to fellowship with Him. This New Creation would come at the defeat of Satan by a Promised One that would somehow uniquely be a "seed" of the woman. In that promise, God also hinted that Satan would, in some way and somehow, have an offspring.

The original Creation and New Creation bookends the recorded Word of God and its reality will

bookend this age. The foretelling of the Promised One and His defeat of Satan and its fulfillment bookends the Bible and the age, too. Sixty years after the ascension of Jesus, His disciple, John, who had been banished to a lonely island, was given a vision of how that promise written 1,500 years earlier and occurring nearly 4,000 years before would come to pass. John didn't write anything new in the Book of Revelation, but he capped off what prophets and even Jesus who came over those thousands of years had said.

In Revelation 19-22, we read of the Promised One, the crushing of the serpent and the New Creation. In Revelation 19, we read that, as a "seed" of Satan, the Antichrist surrounds God's people with armies from many nations, ready to remove them from the face of the earth, the heavens open and out steps the Promised One. Riding on a white horse is the King of Kings, Lord of Lords, one who is Faithful and True — the Promised One. With Him is the army of Heaven made up of faithful celestial beings and those who had committed to follow Him (the saved) in perfect, eternal bodies.

We know this Promised One is Jesus. In Revelation 19, the Apostle John tells how Jesus defeats the Antichrist, the False Prophet and the armies gathered against Jerusalem. It also tells how they are thrown into the lake of fire. The final "offsprings of Satan" are crushed. The next chapter goes further and tells how the Promise One will call for an angel to bind Satan and throw him into the abyss. Later in the chapter, John reveals that Satan will eventually be thrown into the Lake of Fire. This is the crushing of the serpent promised in Gen. 3:15.

work. The goal is more cooperation at various levels to advance the kingdom of God through the Baptist Missionary Association.

Certain foundational principles exist concerning the relationship of a local BMA church to the Baptist Missionary Association as a whole:

•The local church is the foundation of everything. A local church plants another church, not associations. The local church is the governing agency, not the association.

• The local church is God's plan A to reach the world with the gospel, and there is no plan B. Before ascending back to the Father, Jesus told the early church, "But ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you: and ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judaea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth" (Acts 1:8).

The Holy Spirit would empower them to influence their community (Jerusalem), the surrounding region (Judaea), regions beyond (Samaria) and, ultimately, the world (uttermost part of the earth). How could one congregation do that? History teaches that persecution thrust many Jerusalem believers into other areas of Europe and Asia. The Bible reveals a cooperative effort to establish churches in these same areas. Paul's multiple missionary journeys focused on church planting and strengthening existing churches.

Mary chose the better thing.

So, are you ready to enjoy a "Mary" Christmas? Are you submissive and obedient to God's will for your life? Do you believe in His promises? His power? His purpose for your life? Do you ponder on Him?

Do you live a life of freedom and faithfulness, being ever aware of all that Christ has done for you?

Do you have a **(M)** Mind Molded by the words and ways of God?

Do you have an **(A) Anointed** spirit that worships Him with **attitudes** and **actions**?

Do you have a **(R) Responsive** heart that listens and obeys what you have been shown in His Word?

Do you have a **(Y) Yielded** life that chooses to sit at His feet?

— These articles are shared via the National WMA web page blog that can be accessed at nationalwma. org/blogs. The Bible also indicates that Paul encouraged different congregations to work together. One such situation was the collection of funds to assist a struggling Jerusalem church at one point.

Recognizing the biblical basis for working together, early BMA leaders encouraged churches to reach their community, work together with other churches in their area (local association) to spread the gospel, cooperate on a state level to establish larger ministries and unite on a national/international level to impact the world. The model was not necessarily original with BMA leaders, but was ideal for associational Baptists.

What does the average BMA church look like? The average BMA church looks like the majority (59%) of churches nationwide. They average about 60 worshippers on Sunday morning, have limited resources, are led by one pastor who is most often bi-vocational and church programs are led by volunteers (worshipleader.com/ leadership/worship-in-the-averagechurch-in-america).

The average BMA church cannot impact the entire world alone, but by working together with other churches, it can be an instrument of change in a dark world through the power of God. The average BMA church may not be able to help finance every department on every level of our associated work, but the average BMA church can and should support some ministries. The average BMA church may not be able to give hundreds of dollars a month to Missions, Baptist Publishing House, Central Baptist College or the Baptist Trumpet, but most can give a few dollars each month. Consistent giving of any amount makes a huge difference to associated ministries.

While participation at any level of our associated work (local, state or national) is not required, that participation will undoubtedly benefit a congregation and neighboring congregations. Participation involves attendance at meetings, prayer for one another, conversations with each other, cooperative work and giving.

In Arkansas, there are 16 local associations. The number of churches in each association and the ministries they support vary. Some are very active local associations. For example, several local associations sponsor summer camps. A couple of associations sponsor the Association of Baptist Students (ABS) college ministries at Southern Arkansas University and the University of Arkansas. The Central Arkansas Association supports El Faro Bautista Iglesia in Little Rock.

While these are a few that come to mind, others do a magnificentjob of cooperating with other churches in their area to sponsor various other ministries. A church may choose which local association in which it wants to participate. A church may choose its level of participation. A church may determine what level of financial participation it wants to have. However, participation and giving will expand the reach of a participating church and will enhance its ministry.

On the state level, the BMA of Arkansas has four departments — Arkansas State Missions, the *Baptist Trumpet*, Central Baptist College and the Arkansas State Youth Department (Student Ministry Matters). Beginning with the Jan. 10 issue, we will feature articles about each of these ministries that will share where they are located, their ministry structure, financial needs and ways to get involved in supporting these ministries of your association. Other states or regions have similar ministries.

Here again, a church may choose to participate in the state association, the level of financial support and its level of involvement. However, participation and giving will expand the reach of a participating church even further.

On a national level, the BMA of America has seven departments — BMA Global (Missions), Lifeword, BMA Seminary, Baptist Publishing House, Daniel Springs Encampment, Moral Action Agency and BMA Financial Services — along with several sponsored ministries. The reach of some of these ministries is primarily North America, while the reach of others is worldwide. The local church may choose its participation level and level of financial support.

Over the next few weeks, pastors are encouraged to talk to church members about these articles. BMA church members are asked to seek God's guidance in supporting some or all the ministries and discuss that prompting with their pastor.
