


CBC Announces New Trustees



REBECCA MCLAUGHLI **10 Questions Every Teen** Should Ask

We are big fans of books at the BMA of Arkansas Youth Department. Each year, we have tried to put good books into our attendees' hands at our annual Student Ministry Workers Retreat. This past year, Crossway gave us an exceptional deal on 100 copies of 10 Questions Every Teen Should Ask (and Answer) about Christianity by Rebecca McLaughlin. That means every person who attended walked home with a free copy.

This year, we have secured some great deals from Christian Book Distributors, give aways from Replicate Ministries and two free books from Truth For Life (Alistair Begg's ministry). And I'm not done asking yet. I hope you plan on joining us at Central Baptist College on Sept. 14 for another great day. Dr. Owen Strachan will be our featured speaker, with some great breakouts focused on discipleship. You can register at SMWR2024.eventbrite.com.

With Christian bookstores all but gone from the landscape, it can be difficult to determine good books for ourselves and our students. To help in this process, I hope to occasionally review books aimed at those in ministry or students. This week, I wanted to take a few moments and share my thoughts on McLaughlin's book.

10 Questions Every Teen Should Ask (and Answer) about Christianity is a book for tweens and teens who are asking some of the big questions in life. It is designed to equip students with answers as they encounter some of the more difficult questions they may face in school or from their friends. Questions include "How can I live my best life now?", "Isn't Christianity against diversity?", "Can't we just be good without God?" and "Who cares if you're a boy or a girl?" McLaughlin does a great job presenting material that is readable and informative. She utilizes several pop culture references that help draw readers in as she provides sound theological arguments for these harder questions based on logic and God's Word.

As a reader, you may feel uncomfortable with her honesty. In the chapter "Why Can't We Just Agree Love is Love," she discusses biblical marriage, sex and attraction. She shares that she is tempted in the area of same-sex attraction, but realizes that God's guidelines for marriage and love don't allow for that. It is a temptation she must deal with. She goes on to share that if she were ever tempted to have an affair outside of her marriage, it would be with someone of the same sex. She mentions this later in the book as well. I appreciate her forthrightness in discussing this and her clear understanding of what God wants for her and everyone. Our students are hit with this type of information in so many places. It is good to hear someone write and discuss the sinfulness of this issue.

In chapter 10, the author points readers toward a relationship with God by discussing the subject of Heaven and Hell. While she speaks of eternal destiny, she doesn't speak of Heaven and Hell as destinations as much as needed. If you are leading your students through this chapter, you will want to have more firm biblical references on the subject.

If you are looking for a book about apologetics to read with your students or children, this is a great place to start. Our students need to be equipped as they face the realities of this world. They should be ready to stand and give an answer for the faith they embrace. Let's give them much of the Book and good books to help prepare them.





Don't Just Do Something, Stand There My dad was definitely a doer by has promised to renew our strer

nature. He loved being busy and making sure we were not just sitting around but doing something of significance. There were times when he was frustrated with our laziness and would say, "Get up and do something, even if it's wrong." Of course, he didn't mean the last

part, but he wanted to see us being constructive.

In Experiencing God, Henry Blackaby stated, "We are a doing people. We always want to be doing something. Once in a while, someone will say, 'Don't just stand there, do something!' I think God is crying out and shouting to us, 'Don't just

do something, Stand there!" God, first, desires a relationship with us where we get to know Him.

He desires for us to adjust our lives and plans. Think of all the biblical commands to "be still" and to "wait on the Lord." Yes, a time is coming to be doing, working hard and being productive, but first, we are called to abide in Him. In the song Abide, by Aaron Williams, he wrote, "You're the way, the truth and the life. You're the well that never runs dry. I'm the branch, and You are the vine. Draw me close and teach me to abide." Abiding requires a commitment to intentionally build rhythms in your daily schedule to spend time in your secret place with Him. (Psalm 91:1; Matt. 6:6)

Abiding in Hissecret place is not about perfection; it is about progress. Eugene Peterson described following Christ as "a long obedience in the same direction."Abiding is not a competition, nor should it be about comparison; it is about commitment. It means to not just be busy but, instead, standing in His presence by faithfully pursuing Him and refusing to stop or quit. It is making a lifetime commitment to the secret place: a place of intimacy. It is Isa. 40:31 (ESV): "But they who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings like eagles; they shall run and not be weary; they shall walk and not faint."

Why are we so tired when He

has promised to renew our strength and said we will *"run and not be weary?"* Abiding requires making God's priorities our priorities, making first things first. When Jesus was asked what the greatest commandment was, He stated very clearly, *"... Love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all*

your mind." Serving others is listed clearly as "second." Loving God comes first, even before serving Him or others. Jesus then said in Matt. 22:38-39 (HCSB), "This is the greatest and most important command. The second is like it: Love your neighbor as yourself." Loving and serving others is the

Loving and serving others is the second commandment.Jesus saidit's like the first commandment in that it is very dear to His heart, and yet, He clearly placed it second. Jesus was prioritizing your relationship with Him as the greatest priority, and what you do for Him is second.

"Don't just do something, stand there." Why is this so important? When loving God gets your first strength, you will live in spiritual health and have the inner reserve to execute the second commandment well. When your priority is backward, you will give your first strength to other things that are likely to cause you to overextend, malfunction or even burn out. Before you even know it, you are done and ready to quit.

Ministry makes it easier to find your identity in what you do for Him (Second Commandment) instead of who you are in His presence (First Commandment). You are not primarily a worker for God. First and foremost, you are a child of God. You are a son first and a soldier second, always focusing on your intimacy and relationship with Him. Love comes before labor. Jesus wanted to know this from Peter, "Do you love me?" Love comes before labor, and the order is critical to your spiritual health. If necessary, the Holy Spirit is willing to turn our lives right-sideup so we get first things first again.

In Rev.2:4(NKJV), Jesus says to the church in Ephesus, *"I have this*

against you, that you have left your first love." They are told to repent and listen to what the Spirit is saying to them. When He is finished correcting us, if we listen, we will be lovers who work rather than workers who love. The calling to the Secret Place is a calling back to our first love. He desires a people of one thing: the passionate pursuit of His face like David in Psalm 27:4, "One thing have I desired of the Lord, that will I seek: that I may dwell in the house of the Lord all the days of my life, to behold the beauty of the Lord, and to inquire in His temple."

Paul conveys this same "one thing" conviction in Phil. 3:13-14 (ESV), "But one thing I do..." pursuing "the upward call of God "It was also the heart of Mary of Bethany in Luke 10:42 when Jesus said, "one thing is needed," which was to sit at Jesus' feet and hear His words. David's, Paul's and Mary's one thing was the same — the pursuit of a loving, intimate relationship with their Lord and Savior. Here is the difference - putting the second commandment first causes you to be energized by a project; placing the first commandment first causes you to be energized by a person (Jesus).

Yes, we are soldiers of Christ involved in high-level strategic warfare. We are called to fight the good fight of faith. We are laborers in His vineyard, working tirelessly in the harvest to bring all the wheat into His barn. But Jesus did not die on the cross and rise from the dead only to enlist an army or a labor force. We come to the secret place to receive our battle plans from the Commander and to regain strength for our day's labors in the fields, but even that is not the primary role of the secret place. The primary purpose is to protect us from and move us away from religious obligation and service to a close, personal, intimate relationship with Him!





The Royalty of King Jesus

I was just thinking about the lyrics of the Gaither song, "The King is Coming!" How absolutely encouraging it is! It causes me to think about the royalty of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

His Birth

When the magi searched for the newborn king who had been prophesied, they went to the palace of Herod and approached the king, saying, *"Where is the one who has been born king of the Jews? We saw his star when it rose and have come to worship him"* (Matt. 2:2 NIV). When they found Jesus with his family, they showered Him with gifts befitting a king, but He looked like a normal, healthy baby boy.

His Splendor

Near the end of His earthly ministry, Jesus told the apostles that some there with Him would not taste death before they saw Him appearing in His kingdom. Six days later, Peter, James and John experienced precisely that at the transfiguration of Christ atop a mountain.

Jesus was not going to be a future king — he was already King, the Sovereign Lord of all. That trio of apostles saw Him in glorious royalty. It was much like Moses seeing the train of God's glory from the cleft of the rock. "...*His face shone like the sun and his clothes became as white as the light*" (Matt. 17:2). Immediately, the men wanted to do what the Magi wanted — worship the King. The Greek word for kingdom is "basileia."It can be translated as realm,

The Greek word for kingdom is "basileia." It can be translated as realm, royalty or even splendor. Indeed, on that mountain, as Peter, James and John saw Christ transfigured, they saw the royal splendor of the King of Kings and Lord of Lords!

His Trial

Jesus verified His royalty before Pilate the night He was betrayed and brought to trial: "You are a king, then? said Pilate. Jesus answered, You say that I am a king. In fact, the reason I was born and came into the world is to testify to the truth. Everyone on the side of truth listens to me" (John 18:37 NIV).

Again, I remind you, Jesus did not say He would become a king. He already was a king!

His Triumph

The Revelation that John was later given tells us of Jesus one day returning and, when that occurs, He will be wearing many crowns, and His name is the Word of God. But added to that is this: "On his robe and on his thigh he has this name written: king of kings and lord of lords" (Rev. 19:16 NIV).

His Royalty

Unquestionably, Jesus is much more than we humans can comprehend this side of Heaven. But one thing we do know is that Jesus is the Sovereign over Heaven and Earth. He is the royal Son of God, and one day, every child of God will see the splendor of the King. Then, with Moses, the magi, Peter, James and John, we will bow and worship Him who has rescued us from the condemnation of sin.





Jerry Kidd's Story: How He Arrived in Missions

Missionaries are sent and mission work is accomplished because, at some point, someone inspired those missionaries to take the teachings of God's Word seriously. As a result, they gave their whole life to the cause of Christ. Such is the story of Jerry Kidd, who soaked up the teachings of God for the purpose of sharing the Savior with those who need him.

It began in the small Arkansas town of Hope. There was a little church called Unity Baptist Church, and in that church, Jerry Kidd accepted Christ at the age of 12. It was the beginning of the journey in his relationship with Christ — one that is still growing and expanding today.

Throughout his teenage years, Bro. Kidd continued to grow in the faith, and while he was attending Southern State College in Magnolia, he surrendered his life to the ministry. After meeting and marrying his wife, transferring to Central Baptist College and graduating with a Bible degree, Bro. Kidd received his first pastoral position at Eastside Baptist Church in Springhill, La. But this was just the beginning of the Kidds' ministry.

"In 1967, we felt led to go into mission work in the United States," said Bro. Kidd. It was called interstate missions, and we became interstate missionaries. We moved to Ft. Walton Beach, Fla., to work with a mission church there, and we were there for five years."

After having been involved in interstate missions for several years, the Kidds felt God leading them overseas to continue their missions work. They were ready to embark on the journey to foreign missions with God's leading.

"That year, 1972, we went to the missions committee, but they weren't sending out missionaries that year," remembered Bro. Kidd. "So we went to LeTourneau University in Longview, Texas, which was a missionary technology school."

Bro. Kidd recalls that during their time at LeTourneau, he studied to get his pilot's license and took courses in auto mechanics, paramedics and FCC (Federal Communications Commission,

which regulates all interstate communications). In addition, he earned his HAM license, which is an amateur radio license. On top of these courses and more, he was pastoring Ware Acres Baptist Church (now named Camille Acres).

"In 1973, we were elected to go to Bolivia.We chose Bolivia because of a missionary that was working in Bolivia (Marvin Lloyd) who came and shared with me the need of a missionary pilot in Bolivia. That's what I was wanting to do and what I felt God was calling me to do, so we made that choice," said Bro. Kidd.

During 1973, the Kidds were on deputation, raising funds for their ministry. They needed the funds to buy an airplane and get equipment into Bolivia. God provided the funds for their ministry, and on Nov. 8, 1973, they began the drive all the way to Bolivia. It was a three-month journey. They did not arrive at their Bolivian destination until February 8, 1974.

"It's a story indeed," quipped Bro. Kidd as he began to tell the perilous tale of their journey to the South American nation:

"Basically, in every country we went through, we were stopped at customs. We had a large freight truck, the kind where the doors raise up in the back, and it was loaded with supplies for us and Marvin Lloyd, who was already living there. So, the truck was loaded, and I also drove a pickup truck that had a 12foot camper on the back of it. This was where my family lived. We also pulled behind a 16-foot camper for Lloyd and his family!

"So, everyborder we crossed, they had to inspect us. They'd never seen anything like that, and there were all kinds of complications. They would put locks and guards on the truck. Just going through all the different countries slowed us down.

"The main reason we were slowed down, though, is because our travel was during a fuel crisis. And when we got to Panama, since there was no road from Central America into South America, we had to put our rigs and trucks on a boat and ship them around the coast of South America. But the fuel crisis caused

the ships to come to the Panama Canal and just stop. They didn't have enough fuel to go on through, so they were stopping. It was impossible to get a ship that was going around the coast. We were there for 33 days.

"The problem was, we had 30day Visas. We were scheduled to leave on the 30^{th} day and fly to Ecuador. The flight was scheduled at 11:30 at night, but it was delayed, so our Visas expired, and they wouldn't let us leave. Instead of flying out that night, we had to go into town and get an extension, which took three days. Finally, after that, we could leave.

"So, we flew to Quito, Ecuador, and took buses from Ecuador to Peru, where the ship had docked and had our rigs and truck. Then the rainy season began, and the roads were not passable up through the Andes Mountains. We had to put our truck and trailers on a train to carry them to the top of the mountain that borders Peru and Bolivia, where there was a lake. From there, they had an old steamship that we were able to put our things on and take them to Bolivia, where we were able to start driving again.

"Before we were able to start driving, though, we had to stay on top of the flat cars on that train for one week, because they were having a military coup in Bolivia, so we couldn't go into the country. After that, when we finally got into the country, they took all our things away and put them in customs for weeks until we could get our paperwork done. Finally, we were able to drive down to Santa Cruz, Bolivia, where we were going to live and work."

After three months of travel delays, the Kidds arrived at their home for the next eight years where the gospel was proclaimed, disciples were made and countless stories were shaped.

In 1982, they came back to the United States on furlough and attended the BMA National Meeting. There Jerry Kidd was nominated as the assistant director of foreign missions. He took the position and moved back to the States with his family to serve in that capacity.

"We had never, in the BMA, had anyone who had specifically given full attention to the foreign missionaries, and so, I began to work with them," said Kidd. "Through the course of the years, my position changed to director of international missions, and then I transitioned to director of missionary care."

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
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Discerning God's Direction in 2024 (Part 3): Increasing Our Desire for Righteousness

Developing an appetite for the Word and maintaining an awareness of God's presence in our lives are two major variables that indicate whether a believer is growing closer to God. Discerning God's direction for our lives will be difficult without this desire and understanding. For the past two weeks, my articles have been playing off the analogy of a car's dashboard to describe what kind of gauges exist to direct a closer walk with God in the new year. This week's article will discuss the final gauge, an increasing desire for righteousness.

The late Dr. Howard Hendricks contends, in his classic work Teaching to Change Lives, that the goal of Christian education is not to impart knowledge.His argument is framed by presenting two opposites. In most areas of education, the opposite of ignorance is knowledge. However, obedience is the opposite of ignorance when dealing with spiritual matters. It is worth adding that striving for obedience without an awareness of God as personal and present in our lives and a strong appetite for the Word of God is dangerous. Most of the time, the errors that present themselves without an awareness of God or appetite for His Word can be classified as legalism. When we closely monitor all three gauges simultaneously, we can appreciate the most exciting dial on our instrument cluster, the MPH. Again, we'll reorient this meaning for our spiritual dashboard to form a new acronym.

• Measuring righteousness by the Word is the meaning of the first letter. Saying we should increase our desire for righteousness to discern God's will for our lives can be a misleading exhortation if the meaning of **righteousness** isn't defined. Our society has, by and large, embraced the idea that what is right and wrong changes from person to person. Indeed, areas where individual Christian liberty comes into account exist. But the standard of righteousness is not vague or changing. The standard of righteousness found in the Bible is descriptive and unchanging. To pursue righteousness in our lives, Christians must allow the Bible to be their only measurement for comparison.

In the last three months of 2023, a new at-home Bible study began to take shape with several young adults. January is the first month we've started to dive into the material I use to familiarize new believers with the faith. Why has it taken us three months to get to our starting point? Because we needed to lay a foundation of the basic principles for studying the Bible by ourselves and establish that the only authority is the Bible itself. I've made the mistake of rushing through this foundation before. The result has been miniature debate sections about biblical perspectives. By rooting our new Bible study group in the authority of Scripture, we hope to avoid these issues in the future.

• The P in MPH stands for practicing the Word. The easiest step to neglect in Bible study is the application of the Word to one's life. Reading the Bible and hearing great sermons are a means to an end in themselves. They aren't the goal. Just reading the Word will not make a person a more mature Christian; neither will sitting under the finest preaching since Pentecost. Christians who draw nearer to God regularly make personal applications from the text they sit under.

We should be careful not to rush to application before understanding a passage's original meaning and intent. Running the application too early will lead to a superficial

response to the Word. Once we have understood the text we're looking at, we must apply it. The easiest way to ensure we apply Scripture to our lives is to answer two questions — "What will you do?" and "When will you do it?" Instead of being general, adding flesh to the bones moves us closer to fulfilling our intention and obeying the Word.

•Honoring the Word is the final letter of our acronym. The best way to do this is to remind ourselves of what the Bible is. It is more than an anthology of over 40 authors spanning over 1,000 years. The Holy Spirit carried along each author to inscribe each word. Despite the vast period to complete all 66 books, each works harmoniously to deliver the best news ever. Unlike most "open letters" used to provide such news, the Bible is not mindlessly intended to work as a catch-all. Instead, the divine Author masterfully intended the Bible to be delivered personally to all those who belong to Him. My favorite definition of the Bible is a love letter delivered to you. When we cherish the Word of God the way we do a personal letter, we honor it rightly. Doing so gets our gears spinning to pursue righteousness with the right intention. It is impossible to grow in holiness without the grace of God.

The Epic Story of Truth (Part 7): Land Promised, More Rebellion but Promise of Help

In sharing these articles and telling the Bible as one complete narrative, I hope we can see how prophecy and God's continued plan for Israel fit into Scripture. I also hope the story of truth in Scripture becomes larger, and I hope details in Scripture that don't seem to make sense or seem irrelevant today in light of the Gentile church become as relevant as they truly are within God's plan for the ages.

One of the main topics in the Old Testament that seems completely irrelevant to the Gentile church is the emphasis placed on the land. Have you ever thought about that? The land seems like only an Old Testament thing or just an Israel thing, making it seem completely irrelevant for us, the Gentile church, today. But if it is such a meaningless issue for us, why would that subject dominate so much of the Bible?

In the next article, we'll come back to the relevance for us today, but first, let's bring the issue of the land into the narrative. Two articles back, we left off at the Tower of Babel and Moses' additional insight that's recorded in Deuteronomy, in which it's written that Moses said God gave away the people on earth to these prince angels (Paul calls them principalities or rulers of the air in Ephesians 6). Then God created His own people, His portion or His inheritance through the calling of Abraham. God's family would become the descendants of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob - the Israelites.

Since God formed a new people, He then had to give them land — a home.Part of giving away the people at the Tower of Babel was that people were divided into nations and sent to different territories. This account is found in Genesis 10.

God wants His people to have a territory and has one in mind when He starts His new people. When He called Abraham, He revealed that there was already a property picked out and called Abraham to go there: "*The Lord had said to Abram,* 'Go from your country, your people and your father's household to the land I will show you" (Gen. 12:1 NIV).

The necessity of the land came back to the discussion when God sent Moses to lead Israel out of Egypt. He pointed them back to this specific property set aside for His new people: "So I have come down to rescue them from the hand of the Egyptians and to bring them up out of that land into a good and spacious land, a land flowing with milk and honey — the home of the Canaanites, Hittites, Amorites, Perizzites, Hivites and Jebusites" (Exod. 3:7-8).

God picked a land for His people. In His infinite wisdom, He chose the land we know as Israel today. The land was promised unconditionally — the descendants of Jacob weren't required to do anything for the land, but God wanted His people to be holy as He is holy. Though the land is God's and for His people, the land is used throughout history as a tool to guide His people to holiness.

On their way to the Promised Land, God brought His people to Mount Sinai, where He made a covenant with them. He gave them the Law and, if they stuck to their end of that covenant, they would be blessed and live in the land; but if they disobeyed the Law, they would be cursed and removed from the land: "For Icommand you today to love the Lord your God, to walk in obedience to him, and to keep his commands, decrees and laws; then you will live and increase, and the Lord your God will bless you in the land you are entering to possess. But if your heart turns away and you are not obedient, and if you are drawn away to bow down to other gods and worship them, I declare to you this day that you will certainly be destroyed. You will not live long in the land you are crossing the Jordan to enter and possess" (Deut. 30:16-18).


After spending 40 years in the wilderness or desert, the Israelites finally entered the Promised Land. Throughout the rest of the Old Testament and the gospels, we read about the struggle God's people had in living in the land. Again, the land was theirs, but they must obey the Law to live in it. The history that unfolds in the Old Testament tells of repeated cycles of obedience and enjoying living in the land, then disobedience, warnings from prophets to return to God and then repentance. As time went on, the sin of Israel continued, despite the warnings of the prophets. The prophets reminded Israel of the covenant made with God. Yes, He had given them the land, but to enjoy it, they had to obey. Prophets warned if Israel didn't turn back to God, they would be removed from the land.

What the prophets warned would happen happened. First, the 10 tribes in the north would not repent and were taken captive by the Assyrians and led out of the land. This was followed by the same thing happening to the southern kingdom of Judah. After their unwillingness to turn from their sin and idols and turn to God, the Babylonians were allowed to invade and carry the Jews off to Babylon. Their disobedience led to their being removed from the land, just as God had warned.

Though they were removed, God kept His promise that the land was for His people. Even though they were exiled from the land, God gave them hope. In that hope, we get a hint of how the land connects to the greater picture. During the Babylonian invasion, the prophet Jeremiah gave a comforting promise of a New Covenant. Through this New Covenant, they'd be equipped to obey the law and live in the land. This term of the new covenant hits home to us, the Gentile church. It is here where we can find the intersection of the land and us today. We'll look at this intersection in the next article.

Roman 3:23

• Jonah chose to say "no" to God's leading. While not a very smart move, it no less reveals that Jonah had an opportunity to choose to willfully disobey, just as we do. But I wonder if he considered the ramifications of his actions for one minute. Mankind does not often take the time to consider the penalty and cost of their decisions in respect to God's leading. Surely a person would not change their future and the future of others by being defiant, yet it happens every day. Jonah knew he was to blame for the storm and the loss of the cargo and riggings as the others worked diligently to lighten the ship. It would be good if, the next time you are tempted to disobey God, you would stop long enough to count the cost.

• Jonah's message was one of coming judgment as God had had enough. Jonah did not want to go to this group of people. He disliked them and it would be fine with him if they perished instead of repenting. Do we find ourselves passing judgment on those who are not like us? We see Jonah pouting because they heard God's message and turned from their wickedness.

To preach the whole council of God, sometimes it is necessary to explain to people that God is holy and will not look upon sin, how deeply sin offends our Lord and how important it is to tell individuals that God does not mince words. When He says sin has separated you from the love of God, that is exactly what He means. Our message may offend many because they cannot endure the truth. Paul said if they preach any other gospel than the one we shared with you, turn away.

The cardiologist told me there was no one in the state who could help me, and that I really needed to go to the Mayo Clinic. The one in Arizona has my medical records and is reviewing my case to see if they can help or are willing to see me. We really need a break in this area as this has been very difficult these past few months. God has a plan, and we are trying to walk by faith, not by sight. Pray for a divine breakthrough!'
