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No King But Christ (Eph. 1:22-23) (Part 1) By Dr. Clif Johnson, President • BMA of America

Executive Editor's Note: This is the President's Message that was preached in the opening session of the national meeting on April 16, 2024.



It is at this meeting that we gather to conduct the business of the Baptist Missionary Association of America, and we are able to do that because of the historical and redemptive realities of the resurrection of Jesus Christ. But since the resurrection happened,

what spiritual significance and real-time difference does it carry for our churches today? Do we just get to walk around with the resurrection card in our pocket, holding it there until the day Jesus returns and show it to all the world and say, "See! We were right! We told you so!" Or does the most significant, monumental, powerful event in all human history, all cosmic history, carry any bearing on us as Christians, as churches today, right now, that sets us apart from any other institution the world has ever known?

If the world is not to overwhelm us, if the current culture is not to capsize onto us and drown us, if we are not to be caught in the slippery and subtle drift of compromised churches, we must learn, know, believe and act upon the reality that the church is the most powerful institution in all the land—that there is a greater reality unfolding around us than we can see.

Paul made clear to the church at Ephesus, and I pray the Holy Spirit will make clear to us, that there is a spiritual reality much broader, deeper and more powerful than what is initially seen by ordinary sight. In Eph. 1:15, Paul detailed the goals of his prayer for the believers in Ephesus (vs. 17). He desired for them to receive, or perhaps increase, in their spiritual wisdom and understanding.

Now I want us to ask the question, "What is the purpose of spiritual wisdom? What is the purpose of obtaining and deepening our understanding of God?"

Wisdom and understanding are two types of knowledge that are meant to be employed for the

Associational Spirit Evident at Meeting

The 75th annual meeting of the Baptist Missionary Association of America was held at the Chateau on the Lake Resort in Branson, Mo., April 16-18. The theme of the meeting was "No King But Christ." According to the final Enrollment Committee report, 206 churches were represented, with 438 messengers and 122 visitors registered. The total Minute & National Meeting Funds collected at the meeting was \$14,674.75. There were no petitioning churches.

The meeting began on Tuesday night with a concert from Point of Grace, followed by the president's message. BMA President Dr. Clif Johnson (see the printed sermon on page 1) shared a message from Eph. 1: 22-23 with the same title as the meeting's theme — "No King But Christ." He reminded us that the truth of the resurrection of Christ is not merely a historical event to be acknowledged but a dynamic force that empowers and distinguishes the church today. Following the president's message on Tuesday night, and after preliminary introductions and business were taken care of, President Clif Johnson recognized Coordinating Council Chairman Richard Smith to present the recommended changes to the Principles of Cooperation from the Coordinating Council. Discussion of the recommendations began with approval from the body to consider the five recommendations separately (see the full recommendations at BaptistTrumpet.com/BMAA2024):

- Recommendation #1 Remove "annually" and change to "when necessary" regarding electing the directors of all departments (Lifeword, Missions, Baptist Publishing House, BMA Financial Services, Moral Action and Daniel Springs Čamp).
- Recommendation #2 Remove the requirement that a member of the Coordinating Council be elected "from the floor" each year on a staggered basis to serve a three-year term. This recommendation would

Sweet Fellowship

This past week, the churches of the Baptist Missionary Association of America joined together for their annual meeting in Branson, Mo. Over 30 years of ministry, I have always enjoyed the opportunity to join with others and to hear from our national departments. I remember my first meeting in 1991 when I was singing with the Lifeword Singers. I loved being exposed to our national work during my freshman year at Central Baptist College. Since then, national meetings have served as both informational and relational. If you haven't been to one lately, let me encourage you to put it on your calendar for next year. It is set for April 22-24 at Pathway Baptist Church in Waxahachie, Texas. I know it can be challenging to make it happen due to schedules, finances and other responsibilities, especially for bi-vocational pastors, but there is a lot to be gained by attending our national meetings.

• You can find a greater understanding of who we are. This year, there was a lengthy discussion surrounding a proposed change to the Principles of Cooperation. While there was a wide range of opinions surrounding the issue, the discussion helped me better understand who we are and desire to be. There is nothing quite like a variety of opinions to help clarify who we are.

• You can learn about our national departments. Two great things happen at our meetings. One, our departments set up tables to provide information to attendees, and the leaders and their team members are available for face-to-face conversations. It was fun to see one of our pastors have pictures of his children with the different departmental leaders. That is incredible access. While these men are available throughout the year, there is nothing like being able to walk up and ask a question. Two, these leaders provide reports during the meeting. They share the results of their ministries, their hearts and their visions for the future.

• You can find like-minded friends. Ministry can be a lonely endeavor. Church members may never fully grasp the heartache and difficulty those of us in ministry often endure. Associational meetings can provide opportunities to meet others who share your burdens.

• You can find a short break from the routine. Sometimes, we need a day or two away. Going to a national meeting can provide a needed break.

It is easy to come up with reasons not to go, but whether it is local, state or national meetings, it is worth the effort. Talk to your church early. Schedule time off from work if necessary. For us to continue to be effective as a group of churches, it is important that we meet and spend time together. Start making plans for next year today.

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Movement is "the act or process of moving, especially a change of place or posture. It is a tactical or strategic shifting of a military unit, a maneuver." Movement involves action and activity with a series of organized activities working toward an objective. Pardon the simplicity, but movement implies you are moving. At its inception in the Scriptures, the church was essentially a movement built upon a conviction. Jesus said, "I have come to seek and to save that which is lost."The first word of the Great Commission — go — is a word of movement and conveys the truth of "as you are going." It speaks of advancement.

J.D. Greear stated, "The danger of the church in every age is to cease being a movement and become, instead, a ministry that provides service to people, or, even worse, a place people simply attend. Movements move, and if you're part of the movement, you're moving." This can be seen in the evangelistic movement, or lack of, and passion of churches. Churches under three years old reach one new convert for every three members. On average, churches that are three to seven years old reach one new convert per seven members. Churches over 10 years old reach 1 new convert for every 89 members. Entropy just sets in naturally.

BMA Global President Dr. John David Smith wrote this in his document, Mature Church Model, on the theological view of a church: "The Old Testament precedent for the church is found in the word 'qahal.' This literally means, 'those who have heard the call and are following it.' In the Septuagint (the Greek translation of the Hebrew Scriptures), 'qahal' is translated 'ekklesia.' This word is formed from two words: ek (out) and kaleo (called). Ekklesia literally means the called-out ones. The word ekklesia is used 114 times in the New Testament. It can mean a secular gathering or an assembly, but it is used 90 times in reference to a local church.'

Dr. Smith continued, "About 300 AD, the German word Kirche (Lord's house), where we get the English word church, was introduced into Christianity. There is no etymological connection between ekklesia and kirche. From this point in Christian history, the church became a location centered around monolithic buildings, cathedrals, structures and institutions instead of the gatherings that drove the movement of Christ." By definition, a church is not a place. It's a movement. But over the years, that has been lost. Church has become a place we go to, an event we attend. The original church was a movement gathered around a mission.

This movement is not just frenetic activity but an intentional focus and systematic approach to the mission of God. Your church does not have a mission as much as God's mission has a church to carry out His mission. Your church is to be a movement revolving around His mission. John 15:4 (HCSB) clearly states this principle: "What man among you, who has 100 sheep and loses one of them, does not leave the 99 in the open field and go after the lost one until he finds it?" There is a big difference between aspirational values (what you know you should be doing) and actual values (what you are actually doing). Are you actually pursuing the lost?

Dr. Smith continued, "The mission of the church is to give continuation to the mission of Christ. Missions is not a line item in a church budget. It is the purpose for its existence. The multiplication of disciples, leaders and churches must be at the forefront of local church ministry. We must guard against the means to the mission becoming the mission. Our great theological truths were not hammered out in an ancient academic setting; they were formed on the mission field. Almost every book of the New Testament was written to someone starting a new church, or the book was written to a new church.'

The mission of God is why we exist, and you are either actively striving to carry it out, which requires movement, or you are disobeying His command. Acts 2:32 reminds us, "God has resurrected this Jesus. We are all witnesses of this." Witnesses are meant to testify of the truths they have seen and know. Think of the healed lame man in Acts 3:8, "So he jumped up, stood and started to walk, and he entered the temple complex with them walking, leaping and praising God." This man was a living, breathing, visible testimony of the power of God — are you?

The first part of God's plan to save mankind was to send His Son to provide redemption for us through His death, burial and resurrection. In Uncommon Life, Tony Dungy stated, "When Jesus returned to the Father, the next part of the plan was launched the expansion of God's kingdom through the spreading of the good news of the risen Christ. How was that going to happen? Through the disciples He had selected to train, equip and encourage, sent throughout the world with the message of God's love for each of us through His Son, Jesus Christ." You are a part of God's plan A, and there is no plan B.

Are you telling others what Jesus did for you? Are you moving the message of His grace forward by actively sharing it at every opportunity you have? In Made for More, the authors stated, "The role of the local church is to be the mobilizing home base. This empowers all disciples to discover their personal calling, then deploy them to express the fullness of Jesus into every corner of culture and into every sphere of society." If Jesus is Lord of your life, you are living on mission. The local church is a missionary movement of the people of God, saved by the power of God, for the purposes of God.

Are you actively moving toward people who are far from God in order to build relationships with them so you can display the love of God in practical ways? Are you testifying to others about His redeeming grace? Are you surrendered to the mission of God and moving forward on it?

- Recommendation #3 Remove the specific wording regarding the timing and required sessions under Section 2 under Article XXI — Meetings, and replace it with wording that allows more flexibility for scheduling and planning the national meeting.
- Recommendation #4 Changing the board for BMA Financial Services to consist of nine (9) members instead of fifteen (15).
- Recommendation #5 Regarding the duties of the Coordinating Council, in Section 3 of Article VII — Coordinating Council, add the duty that an orientation for the chairman of department and agency boards and committees be provided each year at the national meeting by the Coordinating Council chairman and the executive director of BMA Financial Services.

The first point of discussion began with a point of order, noting that the first recommendation "seemed to be beyond the scope of the instructions given to the Coordinating Council" to "determine a more efficient and effective plan to carry out the annual meetings" of the association. After consulting with

the parliamentarians, the chair ruled that, according to Robert's Rules of Order, an objection to consider a matter requires a 2/3 vote in favor of not considering the recommendation and there is no discussion allowed. The objection did not reach the threshold of 2/3 to pass, although it appeared as though a majority did agree with the objection.

The discussion on the first recommendation continued with some questions regarding what the wording "when necessary" meant and what situations that covered or did not cover. Other discussion revolved around how removing the annual election of the directors would not give the churches (associational body) the opportunity to approve or disapprove every year at the annual meeting. After over an hour of friendly discussion with varying opinions expressed, discussion was closed.

Discussion on Recommendation #2 then began. The discussion seemed to revolve around the same concern — that it would remove power from the churches (associational body) by not giving them the opportunity to elect members from the floor.

The remaining recommendations were presented and discussed very briefly before the meeting concluded for the night.

Following the Legacy Missionary and Commissioning Service on Wednesday afternoon, the business session was opened for the vote on the recommendations without discussion. Recommendations #1 (regarding annual election of directors) and #2 (regarding removal of "from the floor" for Coordinating Council) did not pass. the immeasurable greatness of God's power that is being worked toward us. And those descriptions and results should inform our daily realities as pastors and members of churches.

Those realities and results are the resurrection and enthronement of Jesus as King over all things (vs. 20-22) and also the giving of that King to the church (vs. 23) for His grand purpose.

No King Over the World but the Resurrected Christ

The descriptions of the immeasurable greatness of God's power that is toward us, as believers, is described as being of the same nature of that power that raised Jesus from the dead and then placed Jesus at God's right hand. So, two features to consider here — resurrection power and reigning power.

• Resurrection Power (vs. 19-**20)** — "...According to the working of his great might that he worked in Christ when he raised him from the dead..." (ESV)

If we are going to grow in wisdom for this life as Christians, if we are going to be fulfilling our purpose as churches, we must know that the power that is at work on our behalf and through, that has come toward us by the love of God, is of the same caliber as the power that brought a dead Jesus back to life.

If we do not know that and remember that, we will walk around defeated, lackluster, uninspired and unmotivated, or we will run head long into a battle for souls, into a work to make disciples and plant churches ill-equipped with our own strength, and faulty earthly wisdom. What we must remember and rejoice in today is the resurrection of Jesus. The wages of our sin were given to Christ, and that being death. What we owed for our sin, He paid for by His death. There is no hope, no confidence, no joy, no power, no redemption in a sacrifice that remains lifeless in a tomb! That is only an example to follow of self-sacrifice, but not a victory to triumph in of redemption over sin. There is no cause to follow in obedience to a dead man.

There must be something more, something greater than Jesus taking on the power of sin. And that something greater is the author of life Himself, God Almighty, bringing resurrection power back into the dead body of Jesus. And it is because of the resurrection that we **know** that we have redemption, and resurrection life ourselves, to live beyond death in eternal life starting now!

Listen to me churches of the BMA, the power that is ours from God is an indescribable, unworldly power. So, we should be rejoicing in the fact that not only was Jesus raised from the dead by the immeasurable power of God, but the power that accomplished that very feat has come toward us who believe in giving us new life in Christ! We can be certain of that new life, that our sin is destroyed, no matter how great the sin, because of the power we see in the resurrection of Christ! We not only see a resurrection power, but we also must take notice that this power is a reigning power.

•Reigning Power (vs. 20-21)— "That he worked in Christ when he raised him from the dead and seated him at his right hand in the heavenly places, far above all rule and authority and power and dominion, and above every name that is named, not only in this age but also in the age to come."

I want you to take notice of the lengths the Holy Spirit goes through to show us the absolute nature of this reign of Christ. Jesus is not just above some rulers and authorities, but Paul says that Jesus has been placed far above all rulers and authority. And if we didn't get the point by that statement, Paul continued with every possible realm he could think of—above all power and dominion.

The power and reign of Christ is absolute. Everything falls under His dominion. It all belongs to Him for Him to do with as He pleases.

His resurrection reign is not limited in scope. His resurrection reign is not confined by geographical boundaries. His resurrection reign is not subject to a committee or a vote or term limits. His resurrection reign is not threatened by attacks from lesser thrones. His resurrection reign is not reduced by world events. His resurrection reign is not diminished by political ploys.

He reigns over every nation, over every kingdom set up on earth, visible and invisible. Jesus reigns over church, no matter how large or how small. He reigns over every pretend church. Jesus reigns over every institution, no matter how moral or corrupt. Jesus reigns over all things, and His reign brings blessings and consequences, depending upon whether His reign is recognized and yielded to or not.

But His reign is questioned, mocked and disregarded in this world. If we are not convinced of His reign over all things, satisfied in His reign over all things, drawing comfort from His reign over all things, leading our churches and departments in the confidence of

His reign, then we, as individuals and churches, will cower back in fear. We will be bullied out of the public and pushed into the quiet corners of culture.

Hear what Paul is pleading for — the growth in spiritual wisdom and the understanding of Godthe wisdom to live lives of holiness, godliness and effectiveness, the wisdom to operate and function as churches in the way God designed and the spiritual wisdom of leading and running institutions that are extensions of the church's ministry. If that is to happen, we must know, believe, revel and live in the resurrection power of God and the reigning power of Christ, because it is that same power that is aimed at us in the church. daily rhythms of life — daily use. Spiritual wisdom that is not unleashed into the every day is not true wisdom. Having an understanding of God that is not brought to the surface of our lives is not a fulfilled understanding. Spiritual wisdom and understanding that does not affect the controlled and chaotic moments of our lives, of our churches, is not completed understanding.

In order for that increase in wisdom and understanding to happen, Paul prayed that these believers may know some particular truths:

- To know the hope to which believers have been called (vs. 18),
- To know the riches of the glorious inheritance in the saints (vs. 18) and
- To know the immeasurable greatness of God's power toward believers (vs. 19).

It is this last truth that I want us to dwell upon for our time together — the immeasurable greatness of God's power toward believers. Beginning at verse 20, Paul painted for us descriptions and results of





The Epic Story of Truth (Part 10): The Promised King Came And Was Crucified

As we continue to look at the singular consistent narrative that runs from the table of contents to the maps in our Bible and includes even often "fringe" subjects such as Jesus' return, the end times, God's continued plan for Israel and the unseen world, we began with the promise of a King of Israel and an everlasting kingdom. We're first explicitly introduced to this promise of a descendant of David that will be King of an eternal kingdom of Israel ruled from Jerusalem in II Samuel 7. But hints begin to be introduced in Genesis 49, when Judah is told that the scepter would not depart from his descendants. The ruler from tribe of Judah continued into Numbers 24 through Balaam's prophecy.

The promise of this eternal Davidic King became a major theme of the prophets. We hear it directly from Isaiah, Micah and Daniel:

- "For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders. And he will be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace. Of the greatness of his government and peace there will be no end. He will reign on David's throne and over his kingdom..." (Isa. 9:6-7 NIV).
- "But you, Bethlehem Ephrathah, though you are small among the clans of Judah, out of you will come for me one who will be ruler over Israel, whose origins are from of old, from ancient times" (Micah 5:2).
- "In the time of those kings, the God of heaven will set up a kingdom that will never be destroyed, nor will it be left to another people. It will crush all those kingdoms and bring them to an end, but it will itself endure forever" (Daniel 2:44).

This coming King and kingdom

was a huge concept in the Old Testament and for Jews throughout the time of the Old Testament and in the first century. We don't talk about it a lot today in modern Christianity, well at least it doesn't seem like we do, but every time we use the phrase "Messiah" or "Christ" we do so. The terms mean "anointed one." Messiah is Hebrew and Christ is Greek. The idea matches what we saw in the life of David. Even while Saul was King of Israel, God sent the prophet Samuel to anoint the next king of Israel. He anointed David. Then David became the "anointed one" or "promised one." Throughout the Old Testament prophets, they merge the original promise in Gen. 3:15 of the "promised seed of woman who would defeat Satan and make all things new" with the "promised seed of Abraham who would bless the world" and then the "promised one that would be the eternal Davidic King."

Throughout the Gospels, we see how Jews were looking for this Promised King and Promised Kingdom. Think of all the times Jesus was asked if it was time for Him to start His kingdom.

The people of Israel did finally recognize that Jesus could be this Promised King in how they welcomed Him into Jerusalem on what we commemorate as Palm Sunday. As He rode the donkey into the city, He was treated as the Promised King. The tune of the crowd changed quickly as, in less than a week, they were cheering for Him to be crucified. He was. The one who claimed to the Promised King and established the promised kingdom was crucified on the cross. He died.

The idea of Him being this

Promised King was highlighted as the sign that was nailed above Him on the cross, mocking His claim to be King. Think of how hopeless this situation would be for those who knew the Word of God and had been faithful to it. This One that had been promised had been killed by the people He was supposed to rule. The kingdom that once stood had fallen and still hadn't recovered. It would appear hopeless. Yet, the prophet Daniel recorded a vision in Daniel 9 that foretold that the Messiah would be cut off. Daniel was told, "Know and understand this: From the time the word goes out to restore and rebuild Jerusalem until the Anointed One, (Messiah) the ruler, comes, there will be seven 'sevens,' and sixty-two 'sevens.'It will be rebuilt with streets and a trench, but in times of trouble. After the sixty-two 'sevens,' the Anointed One will be put to death and will have nothing..." (Dan. 9:25-26).

In this remarkable prophecy, Daniel is told there would be a certain number of years that would pass from the decree to rebuild Jerusalem until the Messiah was "cut off" or as the NIV says here, "put to death." Daniel went on to talk about the Messiah finishing His work eventually.

Dive into the Epic Story yourself by reading II Samuel 7, Isaiah 9, Micah 5, Daniel 2, II Chronicles 36 and Luke 19.

Our Words Matter

"The tongue has the power of life and death..." (Prov. 18:21 NIV). That's a bold statement! How could our words be that powerful? This verse explains it pretty well: "With the tongue we praise our Lord and Father, and with it we curse human beings, who have been made in God's likeness... this should not be" (James 3:9-10). And it isn't just our words that matter but our tone, as well. Either way,



we can hurt feelings and crush a vulnerable spirit.

As believers in Christ, what we say should build others up rather than tear them down — encourage rather than discourage. Without the help of the Holy Spirit, it is impossible for us to tame the tongue because, in certain situations, we can quickly spew out angry, unkind and insensitive words. We often preface them with "I shouldn't say this, but..." or we insult, deride or even play a practical joke on someone and then try to cover it over with, "I was just kidding. Can't you take a joke?" We may apologize but the damage is already done. Words might be forgiven, but they are hard to forget.

The Bible says quite a bit about gossip. We are all guilty of it at one time or another. Here are a few examples: "A gossip betrays a confidence, but a trustworthy person keeps a secret" (Prov. 11:13). "The words of a gossip are like choice morsels; they go down to the inmost parts" (Prov. 18:8). In other words, they can hurt deeply. Someone produced this great acronym: THINK—Is it True? Is it Helpful? Is it Inspiring? Is it Necessary? Is it Kind? We should think before we speak so we won't regret what we said later.

What about bad language — curse words, inappropriate remarks, inuendo? These words reflect on a Christian's character, casting doubt on his or her walk with the Lord. This verse, spoken by King David will help anyone struggling to overcome this behavior: "I will watch my ways and keep my tongue from sin; I will put a muzzle on my mouth..." (Psalm 39:1). Solomon said it this way: "Keep your mouth free of perversity, keep corrupt talk far from your lips" (Prov. 4:23).

"You shall not misuse the name of the Lord your God, for the Lord will not hold anyone guiltless who misuses his name" (Exodus 20:7). It is a serious sin to use His name in vain, whether as a thoughtless, casual word to express surprise or dismay, irreverent talk, disdainful joking or attached to curse words. Words used like these show the ultimate dishonor for the holy God. We have no excuse, and this simply should not be.

None of us are perfect. We are going to say the wrong things and use hurtful tones. We can overcome these unhealthy habits by asking the Lord to forgive us and to help us to keep our tongues in check.

Here's the good part, though—these are the words that uplift, encourage, bring healing and love to one another. "A gentle answer turns away wrath..." (Prov. 15:1). "A man finds joy in giving an apt reply—and how good is a timely word" (Prov. 15:23). "The words of the restless pierce like swords, but the tongue of the wise brings healing" (Prov. 12:18). "May the words of my mouth and this meditation of my heart be pleasing in your sight..." (Psalm 19:14).

meditation of my heart be pleasing in your sight..." (Psalm 19:14).

Having the distinct honor of being called children of God, our words must match our walk with Christ if we are to have any influence with other people — saved or lost. There are so many people who are hurting, sad, lonely or just feeling the weight of the world on their shoulders. We are told to speak only what is helpful for building others up according to their needs. We are not to grieve the Holy Spirit. We are to "Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ, God forgave you" (Eph. 4:29-32). "A generous person will prosper; whoever refreshes others will be refreshed" (Prov. 11:25). How fulfilling it is to meet needs and strengthen others!

There are many other verses on this subject, but they all give us everything we need to live a life pleasing to God.
