'We laugh together, share burdens, cry, pray and worship together. Our



It Wasn't Just One

One of the first lessons the Lord put in my heart in ministry was this: **Don't get** discouraged if the whole church isn't on mission.

As a pastor — or any leadership role — I carry the weight of setting the culture. And what I've learned is that most believers love Jesus, want to be faithful and genuinely desire to live on mission. However, when it comes to actually sharing our faith and helping others follow Him, it often gets pushed to the back burner.

We feel stirred after a message or a Scripture reading, but it rarely sticks with us. It's not easy. But I can't read the parables of the talents or the minas without seeing it clearly we are **all** called to the mission. That doesn't mean reaching thousands. Even Jesus focused on 12, and really poured into just 3. But every believer is called to make disciples.

That's the DNA we're building in our church in Pea Ridge. We're not just growing a Sunday crowd — we're raising up everyday missionaries. Through our **Connec**tion Groups, people are being trained to live on mission in their neighborhoods, workplaces and relationships. The fruit is growing, at different speeds for different people, and that's okay.

One moment, a couple of weeks ago, captured it perfectly. Our Garfield Connection Group met at a food truck for their Bible study. The owners were so intrigued, they wanted to shut down early and join in. That night, leaders Rodney and Melinda Chadwell and Tara Simon texted me a photo with this message: "Only one person

showed up — but we had a great time."

What they didn't say, but what I reminded Rodney of, was this: It wasn't just one. It was his niece. The same niece for whom he had prayed for decades. That night, they got to open the gospel and pour into someone whose name had been on his heart for years. And unfortunately, even when we lead in church, we don't get to work with a family member on that level.

It wasn't just one. It was **the one**.

Like many other immigrants, Pablo works hard to stay in the United States, to help his family in Venezuela. For many, the priority is to work tirelessly, leaving little to no time for church, education or recreation. Free time is spent buying food, cleaning his home and washing his clothes.

Every immigrant who comes to the U.S. represents a valuable opportunity to share the gospel and transform their lives. This was true with Pablo. He has been attending Ebenezer Church for a month. In this short time, he has shown a great interest in inviting others.

Since his arrival, his life has undergone a remarkable change, and he now has a deep desire to know God and His Word more. Due to his night shift at UAMS during the week, he is unable to attend our Bible Discovery Studies (DBS). However, we have organized a DBS for him and a group of friends from work on Wednesdays at 10 a.m.

Last week, Pablo told me, "Pastor, Ebenezer is my church, and I want to get baptized and continue to grow in God and His Word." This testimony is a clear example of the impact of your prayer, support and giving. I encourage you to continue praying that God will bring many people like Pablo to Ebenezer — those with a genuine desire to seek God more deeply. To God be the glory!

Coach Brister's Lasting Legacy at CBC: A Life of Faith, Leadership and Impact By Jessica Faulkner



Dr. Aaron Brister, head baseball coach, chair of the Kinesiology Department, and instructor at Central Baptist College, recently completed his 12th season at the helm of the Mustangs baseball program. However, his impact on CBC extends beyond wins and losses — his legacy is defined by leadership, mentorship, and an unwavering commitment to his faith.

Brister, who holds a Ph.D. in Kinesiology from the University of Arkansas, has racked up 358 wins at CBC and 509 total collegiate victories across 20 seasons, including eight years at Emmanuel College in Georgia.

"He is one of the best baseball coaches I have ever been under because of his passion to see everyone succeed," one former player said. "It's not all about baseball with him — it's about using baseball as a platform to impact lives."

Since arriving in 2013, Brister has coached dozens of student-athletes who have continued their careers at the professional level, including Ben Madison, who was drafted in the 9th round by the San Francisco Giants in 2018. He has also mentored a coaching tree. Fourteen former CBC players now coach at the collegiate level, with another 18 coaching in high schools or athletic training programs

coaching in high schools or athletic training programs.

Off the field, Brister wears many hats. He is an instructor and academic leader, a devoted family man and a minister. He serves as the Family and Involvement Pastor at Four Winds Church, where he teaches Sunday school, leads worship and helps with outreach events. He and his wife, Billie Jean, have three children — Eden, a CBC graduate and a founder of the Tri Ziva women's social organization; Lilly, a junior volleyball player at CBC; and Isaiah, a sophomore at Conway Christian School.

Brister's passion for ministry also extends globally. He has led international mission trips for over 20 years. Just this past December, he took 20 CBC student-athletes and staff to Havana, Cuba, where they conducted sports evangelism camps, street witnessing and house-to-house ministry.

"He is a coach and leader who makes everyone around him better — not only on the field, but in life," said another player. "I learned from Coach Brister to always trust the Lord in all situations because the Lord will always provide you peace."

One of Brister's most cherished memories at CBC occurred in 2015, when his team played at Busch Stadium in St. Louis, just minutes after a Cardinals walk-off win, in front of 43,000 fans.

"It was surreal," Brister recalled. "Several alumni and friends of CBC were in attendance. That spring of 2016, the same team went on to set the all-time win record at 45-16 and won the program's first-ever conference championship. To God be the glory!"


When asked what first brought him to Conway, Brister said it was nothing short of divine timing. "I know it sounds 'churchy,' but I know the Lord brought me to CBC," he said. "My wife and I had been praying for the Lord to bring us back closer to Arkansas... After our last game, I was walking back to our bus and received a text message about the job opening. I took my resume in person to Conway. The rest is history! God's timing is perfect!"

Brister's commitment to spiritual development is evident in every aspect of his program. Each winter, his baseball team participates in a spiritual retreat, and in the past five years, 17 players have accepted Christ during these retreats.

"Central Baptist College is a phenomenal Christ-centered institution," Brister said. "We offer an educational experience that competes with any school in the state... Serving Jesus is the underlying pulse of everything."

As CBC looks to the future, Coach Brister's legacy will remain firmly rooted in a life that combines excellence in coaching with a passion for serving others — on the field, in the classroom and across the globe.

"He never gave up on me," one former player reflected. "He always had my back through the best and worst times."
